There are three books that I highly recommend to support your PLC and collaboration. What isn't available from NMPED, can be purchased by High Plains REC.

### <u>Learning by Doing</u> (3rd edition, 2016) – Richard DuFour, et al.

Dufour's foundational book that covers the entire PLC process including how to build teams, how to develop common assessments, how to create interventions, and how to address team conflict. This is the bible of the PLC process, and it is an essential book for effective collaboration.

## Revisiting Professional Learning Communities at Work (2nd edition, 2021) – Richard DuFour, et al.

Previously provided by NMPED to all districts (21-22); while *Learning By Doing* helps you with HOW to design PLCs, this publication addresses the WHY we should collaborate.

### How to Develop PLCs for Singletons and Small Schools (2015) – Aaron Hansen.

This book may actually be the most helpful for all of you, as it talks specifically about how to collaborate in small schools and how elective teachers can participate in collaborative teams with core teachers. It's an easy read and has some great ideas, including the virtual structure that some of you are (hopefully!) doing right now. This link should work for you: singletons-and-small-schools

## Let's talk about the ONE question that everyone on your team must be really clear on as you collaborate:

What do you want your students to learn, know, and be able to do?

It is critical. You MUST be able to answer this question. Why? If you don't know what you want your students to learn, know, and be able to do, how are you able to:

- Create lessons, including a lesson objective and activities that support learning?
  - Build assessments (formative or summative)?
  - Provide support for students who are having difficulties (reteach, intervene)?

This question is VITAL and is the foundation of your teaching. So, if you do nothing else this week, ask yourself, *Is it clear in my mind what I want my students to learn? If not, how can I make it clear, so that I can effectively teach, assess, and intervene?* 

This is a GREAT question to initiate discussion with your teams at school, as well as when you meet in your region-based teams again. Collective wisdom can easily help us solve problems. I hope that all of you are continuing the conversations started in August and that you are you are taking advantage of each other's wisdom.
